PHILANTHROPY RECAP

This year the Mu Chapter made solid strides with our efforts to raise money for Save a Child's Heart, an organization that provides life-saving cardiac care to children across the Middle East. In the fall, we brought back our popular Concert for a Cause event, but added a week of promotional fundraising events leading up to the show. Brothers set up tables on Beta Bridge and the Corner in groups of three, with a theme of 'AE Pie a Brother'. Each donation allowed passer-by to hit one of our brothers with a whip cream pie. Local grocery stores generously donated part of our whip cream supply, which helped make the philanthropy financially sustainable. At the end of the week we raised over 1100 dollars for SACH, and the concert itself was a success, thanks to our tremendous headliner, RDGLDGRN!

During spring semester we held a 3-week long series of events in February, which played into the Valentine's Day heart theme, as well as an international campaign that SACH was promoting. Our events consisted of four nights of Drink Your Heart Out events at 5 different bars on the corner, through which purchasing a \$5 wristband granted various drink specials. We also had bake sales three times a week on the lawn to promote the bar nights. In total we were able to raise over \$2,000. To execute these events, we worked in collaboration with 'Hoos for Israel, the Jewish Social Justice Connection, and the Israel Campus Coalition, and we hope to continue this in the future and make it an annual event!

This year the brothers of AEPi have engaged in a number of great Jewish experiences. Things got started early on with Sukkot. A group of brothers spent an afternoon constructing a traditional Sukkah on the porch that would be used throughout the week for dining, study, and fulfilling the mitzvah of shaking the lulav. A few weeks later, Rabbi Shlomo Mayer came to the house to lead a text study with the entire colony on the nature of brotherhood and forgiveness as it is presented in the Torah. The study session was very informative and sparked some great discussions amongst the brothers for days to come. The week before winter break, our chapter had its first Farbrengen – a traditional Jewish practice of gathering after Shabbat dinner to share words of Torah and offer toasts to positive experiences and life lessons learned. This was a great opportunity for the brothers to not only learn some words of Torah, but also to reflect on the past semesters activities and to share our reflections others experiences together.

Over winter break 11 brothers participated in 3 different trips to Israel. (Insert names) participated in the 2 week Taglit Israel birthright trip. This program provides a free trip to Israel for every young Jewish adult who has not had the opportunity to go. Over the course of the trip our brothers traveled across the country connecting with our homeland and getting a feel for the everyday lives of Israeli Jews. I participated in the Israel Links program, which focused on Torah study and Chassidic practices in the mystical city of Tzfat, and Master Saul Brodsky studied with the Akiva program. In the spring semester, AEPi participated in Hillel's annual Shabbat Around Grounds program. ShAG encourages members of UVA Jewish student body to bring Shabbat into their homes by hosting dinners in multiple settings around grounds. AEPi did just that, hosting a full meal open to brothers and other members of the community. We concluded the year by holding a Passover Seder at the house. Led by two newly initiated brothers, Zak Krooks and Ben Gilbert, the fraternity retold the story of the exodus from Egypt while also celebrating the end of our pledge program and the growth of our brotherhood. Overall, these experiences have provided valuable opportunities for each brother to further explore his own identity, and for the chapter as a whole to grow closer to each other and to our brothers around the world.


